

ICQ and CCQ

ICQ (Instruction Check Question) and CCQ (Concept Check Question) are crucial tools in teaching English. They aim to ensure that students have understood the instructions and concepts presented in the lesson.

By using these techniques, educators can measure comprehension, clarify misunderstandings, and encourage active participation in the classroom.

Definition of ICQ and CCQ

ICQ refers to specific questions aimed at checking whether students understand the instructions given by the teacher.

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Purpose of ICQ and CCQ in teaching English

Examples of ICQ and CCQ in action

ICQ Example

After atask, the teacher asks the students, "What do you need to do first?"

If the students respond correctly, the teacher knows that they have understood the instructions.

CCQ Example

When introducing a new vocabulary word, the teacher might ask, "Can you use this word in a sentence?"

This allows the teacher to check if the students comprehend the word's meaning and usage.
